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Minutes of Membership Meeting July 17th, 2006

The meeting started at 7:07 pm.

Officer Scott King, our acting CPO, spoke of recent problems in our area the past month. Parking problems around the soccer fields seems to be going away, the message was clear with 16 citations issued last month. For one month, a portable speed limit sign will be

going up in that area; hoping to reduce the speed limit to 25

Parking citations have been given out on 22nd Ave. N. for parking across the sidewalk that seems to be resolving as

Officer King also spoke about new signage regarding parking, it will be going up on the west side of Park Street on the Avenues. So that there won't be so many problems with illegal parking.

The biggest problem in our area continues to be car thefts; seems to be mostly Chryslers models are stolen as they are the easiest to steal. There were 117 cars stolen this past Sunday. Another 32 were stolen from the Home Depot parking lot last Wednesday. Publix shopping center is another hot spot for stealing cars. Officer King also answered various questions our members asked.

Dale Armstrong, from Pinellas County Extension Services, Florida Yards and Neighborhoods, spoke about Florida Friendly Yards. He discussed such issues as planting the right plant in the right place; native plants are best; watering efficiently and conserving water (turn off those sprinklers if has just rained or is raining); mulching; using compost; fertilizing appropriately; controlling pests responsibly; and how important it is to provide for the wildlife.

Minutes of the June meeting were accepted; as well as, the Treasurer's Report.

Tom Killian spoke of the good response for ticket sales to CONA Neighborhood Night at Tropicana, Rays v. Orioles, on July 21, 2006, and he mentioned that the Rays were going to offer tickets for the last home game of the season, on September 25, 2006, at 7:15 pm against the Yankees. Tickets will be offered at \$5.00. Please come and support our Jungle Terrace Civic Association, the Rays as well.

The BMX/Skate Park project was brought up. Work has apparently stalled on the new BMX Park due to problems with the area (outside of Jungle Terrace) where it is being built. This has the proposed Skate Park on hold until the problems with the BMX Park issue get resolved.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:25 pm.




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Walter Fuller Recreation Center Pool Swim Lessons By JTCA Secretary - Paula S. Zachem

All of the swim instructors are excellent and classes are small enough so they can take the time necessary to help each child out. They also know how to make the lessons fun and enjoyable.



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TWO YEARS LATER

The last details of Jungle Terrace's Industrial Parks' final monument is now in place and the project is official completed. Good job to all who were involved and only periodic maintenance is needed at some time in the future, as long as no major damage occurs to the structure. For it is the responsibility of the Jungle Terrace Civic Association to maintain all the monuments in the neighborhood.





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White flies are abundant on many plants, especially hibiscus. The adult of this pest is a small, snow white, gnat like insect about one sixteenth of an inch long. There are three peak broods of these adults each year. March-April, June-July and September-

October. These insects, as adults, do not feed on or damage plants. It is better to wait three weeks after seeing adults to start treatments, so to get the young or larva that have hatched. It's the young doing the damage, by inserting their beak into the leaf and feeding on the sap in the leaf. Orthene and Bifenthren are two materials for control.

CREPE MYRTLES

If your crepe myrtles haven't bloomed, you probably had a heavy infection of powdery mildew. Neutral copper is a good fungicide for the control of powdery mildew. Apply on a weekly basis or until control is obtained.

POINSETTIAS

Remember to cut about six to eight inches off the terminal growth of your poinsettias. Add magnesium sulfate to deepen the color. On medium sized plants, use one half to one cup. Don't forget to fertilize after removing the tip growth. Use any good mixed fertilizer such as a 6-6-6.

CHRYSANTHEMUMS

Check all perennial chrysanthemums for spots on the leaves. This fungus will cause excessive leaf drop if the plants are not sprayed with Daconil or a similar fungicide. Applications of the fungicide should be made at least every two weeks. **FIGS** - are ripening now. Cover the plants with light netting to prevent birds from ravaging the fruit. Apply an all organic fertilizer and spray on a biweekly basis with neutral copper to prevent rust on the leaves.

SOD WEB WORM

It's a little early for sod web worms but watch the lawn closely. This is a small caterpillar three fourths of an inch long. Its color is greenish, and covered with small, dark, inconspicuous spots.

They get their name "webworm" because they leave many webs in areas where they have been working. These webs are easy to see early in the morning when the grass is covered with dew. My experience is they become more active in damaging lawns after rains.





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Preparing for a Hurricane Plywood Installation by Bob Miller

Last summer I finally went to the trouble of installing plywood protection for hurricanes. For years I just "didn't get around to it". The year before we had hurricanes pass within 40 miles on all sides of St Pete. I decided it was time to stop dodging the bullet and do some things to prepare. Never having done anything like this before, I learned a few things the hard way. I'm writing this article to pass along some of those lessons. I'm only going to discuss masonry and stucco structures. Actually this will be limited to the type of structures pictured but a lot of homes in our neighborhood are built like this.

The first step is to decide how much plywood you will need. Need to measure your windows, see photo below. The plywood will sit on the window sill. You should plan

to have the plywood extend 4 - 5" on both sides and on top. You will also need some tools. A large square, a hammer drill, a circular drill, saw horses or something to lay the plywood on for cutting and drilling, measuring tape, and a 1/4" ratchet. The plywood is pretty heavy so having a friend to help with the lifting is a good idea. The fasteners I used can be purchased at one of the local supply stores like Home Depot or Lowes.

The next step is to use a circular saw to cut the plywood to the proper size. Again the plywood should extend 4-5 inches to either side and top. Saw horses make this much easier. You will probably find that you only have three or

four different size windows on you house so you can use the first one of a size as a template.

Next you need to decide where you want to put the fasteners. I was told by one of the assistants at the store that drilling the block is preferred to drilling the mortar joint on a concrete block wall, for strength. Of course with Stucco you don't know where the mortar joint is so place the studs as recommend on the kit instructions.

After you have the plywood sized, the next step is to use a 1/2" bit (for wood use only) to drill the wood in the locations where you want the fasteners (photo below). A regular drill is fine for this. **This must be done before drilling the hole in the masonry.**

Next put the plywood up onto the location where you want to attach it. A 2 x 4 can be used to hold it while you drill the masonry (See photo below). For this step you will need a hammer drill with a masonry bit.



!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!CAUTION!!!!!!!!!!!!

DO NOT use the hammer drill and masonry bit to drill the plywood and masonry wall at the same time. If you try this you will melt the masonry bit! The damp plywood will not allow the masonry bit to cool. The wood must be drilled first with the larger 1/2" bit.

Below, using a hammer drill to drill the holes for the studs. With a good bit, the hammer drill makes short work of this task. Using a regular drill you will be at it a long time.


Next screws in the stud (photo below). Here you use a ratchet wrench with and adapter that comes with the fastener kit. After the studs are installed, the wing nuts are put on. To remove the plywood - just remove the wing nut and install the protective cover on the studs.



Below is the plywood with the wing nut installed and secured.



The kit includes small rubber covers for the studs protection.




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The Jungle Terrace Internet Discussion List
