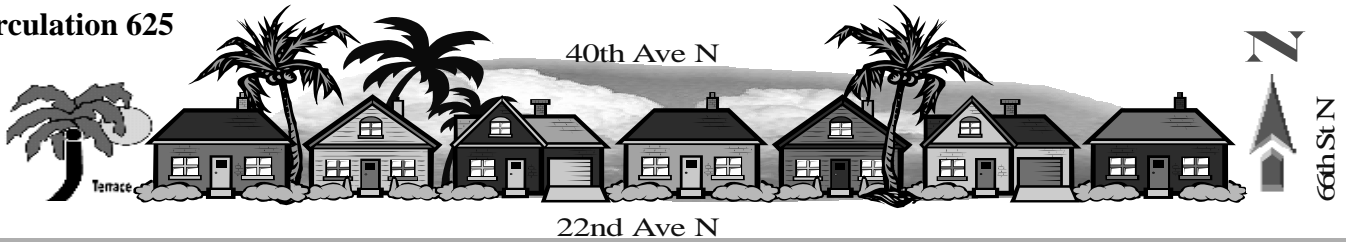

Minutes of the July 19, 2004 Monthly Membership Meeting

- Our President, **Tom Killian**, called the meeting promptly at 7 p.m. with 32 members and guests in attendance. After the pledge of allegiance to the flag, the attending officers were introduced. The minutes of the June meeting were read and approved as was the treasurer's report.

- Our CPO, **Officer Hladik** reported current events. (See the CPO article for specifics. Page 16)
- Our Guest Speaker, **Doug Duncan**, from the Metro Crime Prevention of Florida, spoke regarding personal safety, home safety, and how to avoid becoming a crime statistic in general. **Mr. Duncan** is retired after being an officer in both Vermont and Texas. He spoke for approximately 45 minutes and covered a vast number of topics including pepper spray, security systems, cell phones, identity theft, car jacking, theft deterrent, and a host of additional items.
- We were also fortunate to hear from guest speaker **Ms. Sandy Tabor** who is with the Foundation's Presenting Organization for the Mahaffey Theater. **Ms. Tabor** advised of the various program the theater offers including a children series as well as some upcoming events, such as the Florida Orchestra, Pink Floyd Laser Light Show and Remembering Elvis. **Bob Jones** who will be directing their first production, *Black Nativity* was also on hand to explain what you could expect from the gospel performance. We were informed the theater will be closed in May, 2005 for approximately six months for renovation. Further, the nearby arena will be imploded in March of 2005. **Ms. Tabor** offered a set of free tickets to an upcoming event which was won by attendee, **Denise Ruggiero**, in a drawing.

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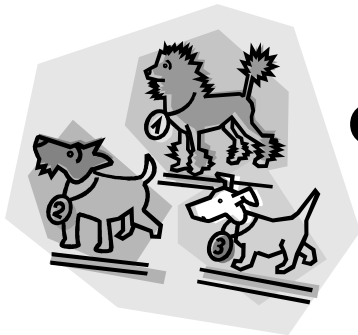

Fort De Soto Park

We are very fortunate to have so many wonderful parks here in West Central Florida. Many of these parks are county parks and Pinellas County certainly has a great selection. Fort De Soto Park has always been one of my favorites.

To get to the park, you can take I-275 South to the Pinellas Bayway or from St. Petersburg Beach take Gulf Blvd. south to the Pinellas Bayway. Follow the signs to Fort De Soto Park. There are two tolls for a total of \$.85 to get to the park but the return trip is free.

Fort De Soto Park is made up of five islands or keys. Madeline Key, St. Jean Key, St. Christopher Key, Bonne Fortune Key, and the main island, Mullet Key. Together the keys total 1,136 acres with over six miles of beach frontage and several miles of waterfront along Mullet Key Bayou.

This park has something for everyone. Boat Launching (\$5.00 parking fee), a 1,000-foot gulf and a 500-foot Bay fishing piers, camping, seven mile multi-purpose trail, protected swimming beaches, a museum, a historic fort, dog park, and picnic area's galore.

The Museum is small but very well done. Items on display were recovered from the time when Fort Desoto was used by the military to protect the entrance to Tampa Bay.

At 800', Fort De Soto has one of the largest boat launching ramps in the area. The ramp area has 11 floating docks and was recently improved.



One of 238 camp sites available at Fort De Soto. More than half of the sites are waterfront just like this one. All of the sites have water and electric hook up. Modern restrooms, a dump station, a camp store, and laundry facilities are provided for your convenience.

The park property was first purchased from the federal government in 1938 for \$12,500. In 1941 the property was sold back to the federal government for \$18,404 to be used as a gunnery and bombing range during World War II. The property was repurchased from the United States in 1948 for \$26,500.



Large guns were installed to protect the Bay entrance.



There is a picnic only area that has many shaded picnic tables. A cool breeze off the water and a beautiful view make this area very popular.



A large fenced dog park also sports, of all things, a pet shower area. It's a good place to give a large dog a bath without creating a big mess around the house!

Parking Codes for St. Petersburg

WHERE TO PARK

There are city codes that govern where you can park in a residential district. Depending on the orientation of your lot, other rules may apply, but in general;

- Passenger vehicles and motorcycles can be parked in the front of the house or in the street side yard provided they are located on an approved, legally recognized parking area or driveway. Legally recognized parking areas and, driveways are approved by the Development Review Services Department of the City. The construction, location and size of the parking area must be reviewed. Call 893-7471 for more information.
- Parking is never allowed on the right-of-way (R.O.W.) area between the paved street and the private property line unless the vehicle is parked on a driveway apron that has been installed with the required permit and the vehicle does not block the sidewalk.
- Your Community Police Officer will be notified of any and all R.O.W. parking and you could receive an illegal parking ticket. Both recreational vehicles and boats are considered domestic equipment and up to (2) two pieces of domestic equipment may be parked on certain areas of a residential lot. To be considered domestic equipment (which includes motor homes, trailers and utility trailers), the items cannot be designed or intended to be used for commercial purposes. Commercial equipment cannot be parked in residential districts except within completely enclosed and legally permitted structure.
 - a. Parking or storage of domestic equipment is not permitted in a front yard, on a corner lot, within a street side yard or in a waterfront yard.
- You may legally park domestic equipment in the rear or interior side yard of a lot. Up to (2) two pieces of domestic equipment may be parked in the front and/or street side yard, for weekend use, between the hours of 4:00 PM Thursday and 8:00 AM Monday, only.
 - a. Each piece of domestic equipment may be up to 35 feet long, up to 8 feet wide and up to 12 feet high. Anything larger is not allowed.
- The parking codes were designed for several reasons;
 - a. When cars are improperly parked, grass and plants are unable to grow. Soil erosion begins to wash into the storm water drainage system and impairs their effectiveness.
 - b. Improperly parked vehicles and domestic equipment can cause visibility and safety problems for motorists on streets and driveways.
 - c. Well maintained parking areas make the entire neighborhood look better which has a positive effect

on property values in the neighborhood.

- d. Underground utilities, curbs, and sidewalks are often damaged by the weight of the vehicles parking and driving over them.

The Codes Compliance Assistance Department office has free brochures titled "Where to Park" and "Parking Commercial Equipment". The complaint line phone number for reporting a violation is 727-893-7373.

ACCEPTABLE PARKING SURFACES

The following materials are considered to be acceptable residential parking surface materials within the right-of-way:

(1) Concrete (2) Asphalt (3) Brick
As of January 1, 1997, the following materials are considered acceptable residential parking surface materials for the main driveway on private property.

(1) Concrete (2) Asphalt (3) Brick (4) Crushed Rock/Brick (5) River Rock (6) Gravel (7) Pavers (8) Geoweb/Turfblock (sodded or plugged)

Above referenced items 4-8 must be contained/framed-in with wood or other approved and appropriate edging, and maintained in a weed-free condition. Mulch is no longer an acceptable surface for the main driveway, unless it is already an existing mulch driveway which was previously approved by the City. Mulch is only permitted as a parking surface for approved parking areas adjacent to the main driveway.

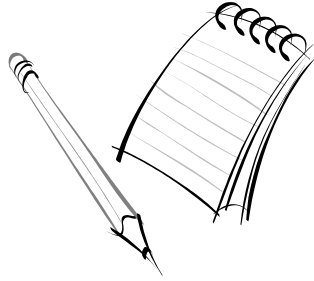
- Approved plans by the City are required for parking area and driveway, but no permit is necessary.
- Mulch must measure 4" thick, compacted.
- Border around parking area must be 2" above the mulch along the perimeter and 1" above the mulch along the driveway to keep the mulch in place.
- Border is also required if driveway (excluding apron) is gravel, to be 1" above the gravel abutting the apron and on both sides of the driveway perimeter.
- No more than 25% of the front yard and street side yard of a corner lot, or 45% of the front yard of an interior lot can be impervious surface.
- For parking plan approval, please bring a copy of a surveyor a drawing to scale of your property with your parking area proposal to the Development Review Services Division which is located at One Fourth Street North on the first floor of the Municipal Services Center. NEIGHBORHOOD NOTEBOOK

Jungle Terrace has filed its Neighborhood Partnership grant application earlier than any other neighborhood for the second year in a row. Bayou Bonita and Snell Isle also turned in their grant requests before the July 2 early deadline. All three neighborhood associations earned 20 bonus points toward their overall score. A committee of neighborhood leaders and city administrators reviews grant applications and assigns a point value to each section. This is the first year for the Neighborhood Partnership's early filing incentive. Bonus points come into play in the event of a tie between neighborhoods, Partnership director Susan Ajoc said. Grants top out at \$25,000, with the neighborhood or group matching the grant amount with cash, materials, labor or services.



GREEK SPINACH QUICHE

1 (10 oz pkg)	Frozen chopped Spinach
1 c	Milk
1 c	Feta Cheese, crumbled
3	Eggs, beaten
¼ c	Butter or Margarine, melted
2 TBS	All purpose flour
½ tsp	White pepper (black will do)
2 TBS	Grated Romano or Parmesan cheese
¼ tsp	Salt
Dash	Ground Nutmeg
1 single	Pastry for 9 inch pie

- Line a 9 inch quiche or pie plate with pastry. Prick bottom and sides with fork. Bake at 400 degrees for 3 minutes; remove from oven; prick with fork again and bake 5 minutes more.
- Cook spinach according to package. Drain and press out excess water.
- Combine spinach and remaining ingredients. Mix well.
- Pour into pastry shell. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 to 35 minutes or until set. Let stand 10 minutes before serving. Yield: 6 to 8 wedges, depending on how you slice it.
- NOTE: Filling and pie crust can be prepared ahead (keep separate) and put together just before baking.
- Serving Size: 8



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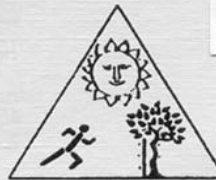

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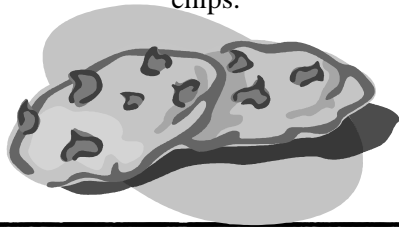

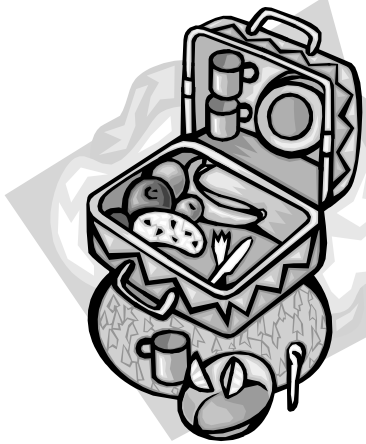
