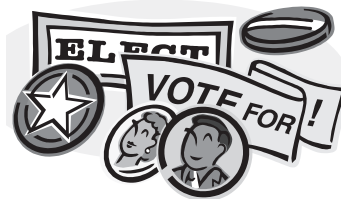
## Jungle Terrace 2010 Elections

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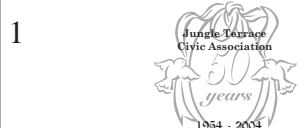

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## Ikebana

**IKEBANA** is the Japanese art of flower arrangement, also known as *kadō*, the ("way of flowers").

IKEBANA is a disciplined art form in which nature and humanity are brought together. Contrary to a collection of multicolored of blooms, IKEBANA emphasizes other areas of the plant, such as its stems and leaves, and draws emphasis towards shape, line, and form. Though IKEBANA is a creative expression, it has certain rules governing its form. The main rule is that all elements used in construction must be organic, be they branches, leaves, grasses, or flowers. The artist's intention behind each arrangement is shown through a piece's color combinations, natural shapes, graceful lines, and the implied meaning of the arrangement.

The different schools of Ikebana include Ikenobo, Ohara and Sogetsu. As in the martial arts, individuals learning IKEBANA rise through various levels of achievement. BARBARA GOSS, this month's speaker, is a recognized Sensei (Master level) in Sogetsu, earning the rank of Sanyo Shihan while living in Japan.

She served as chapter President of Ikebana International 1968-1970 and in 2004-2005. She is a current Board Member, and is Co-chair of the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Jubilee in 2012. Barbara-sensei's flower name is Koseki.

Barbara teaches IKEBANA design and arranging – one of her passions for more than 40 years. The annual show "KOI and IKEBANA" is March 6 & 7 at the Treasure Island Community Center. This is a meeting you will all want to attend.

## President's Message

Fruitful two months! Pinellas Trail: JTCA sponsored a West Neighborhoods United (WENU) meeting of 22 leaders, including neighborhood presidents, 2 City Council Members, and 6 Police Officers.

An "Action Plan" developed for Locator Markers, Safety, and Maintenance, and WENU grant for "Trail Patrol" tee shirts to give to periodic users of the Trail. Send your size request to Tom Killian.

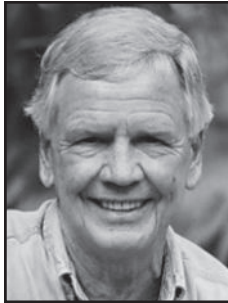
Signs regarding dogs are installed, "LAWS: DOGS in PARK" flyer created for distribution, and Police are scheduling enforcement patrols.

TOM and ED met with CLIFF FOOTLICK, Parks Director; MIKE VINEYARD, JIM DEBEE, and PHIL WHITEHOUSE regarding remaining details in Walter Fuller Park. All are being accomplished, including painting the Batter's Eyes, removing tires from the lake, and asking Stormwater Department to install low chain link fences at each entry drain to catch debris before it enters the lake.

This team also agreed to our plan for a "Volunteers Celebration Garden." The City will add 2 sprinklers, dig out 8" deep, fill 6" deep with planting soil, and deliver a load of mulch. Many thanks to each! JTCA will design, acquire plant materials, install and maintain the Garden.

Progress Energy Anvil Substation improvements: I met with PE, showed photos of rusty fence and trashy trees. They have cleaned up trees, cut out palms, and are getting a bid on street side green vinyl fence. Revamping and "storm hardening" project will have minimal impact on Jungle Terrace. Lines go under Anvil, along 22<sup>nd</sup> Ave. west to 74<sup>th</sup> Street, south under 22<sup>nd</sup> Ave. and up to go aerial along 74<sup>th</sup> St. to Central, then out to the beaches.

Flowering Tree Grant awarded JTCA and REPOP each 10 trees. These are planted along 26<sup>th</sup> Ave. North, 75<sup>th</sup> St. to Anvil, then south along Anvil at Coastal Marine. The company was very accommodating and their irrigation system creates healthier

## Is That Poo on My Shoe?

We all know that the minor task of cleaning up their poo is a small price to pay for the uninhibited love they show for us when we get home from a bad day at work, wagging their tail so hard their whole body sways back and forth.

The most important things you can do regarding pets is first don't lose the one you have. Get them chipped and make sure they have a tag with your cell phone number. That's the way to have the fastest reunion with a wayward pet. I have seen many of your fences and believe me, your dog can get out whenever he or she wishes. If ole Wally finally passed on to the great dog park in the sky and you swore you would never get another one, I challenge you to go to one of the adoption centers and take a walk through. ## Jungle Lake Outfall Stormwater Improvements

The City Engineering and Capital Improvements Department and the design consultant, PBSJ, are proceeding towards completion of the design work at the Jungle Lake Stormwater Improvement Project. The project will provide drainage capacity improvements for the Jungle Lake outfall to Boca Ciega Bay by replacing the existing inadequate stormwater piping with large culverts. Stormwater quality improvements will, also be provided by the installation of a nutrient removing baffle box to trap litter and debris that enter the storm drains before they reach Boca Ciega Bay. Project design work is scheduled to be completed by March, 2010 and construction is expected to commence by early summer, 2010. The construction cost is estimated to be \$5 million. This project has received the support of the Southwest Florida Management District (SWFWMD) in the form of 50% cooperative funding.

## Egmont Key State Park

Accessible only by private boat or ferry. This is a very historic island whose lighthouse has guided ships into Tampa Bay for over 150 years. A



daily ferry boat takes people from the Ft. Desoto pier to the island, a 12 minute boat ride \$20.00 round trip. Call ahead for ferry boat ride schedule.

The island had three cannon battery on the east side to protect Tampa harbor. The cannon's have been removed and put at Fort Desoto. The concrete battery's still stand overlooking Tampa Bay.

It's an eerie feeling walking down the old brick roads that were used hundreds of years ago.

The island is home to gopher tortoise, about 1,000 of them. They live to about 70 years of age. There are also box turtles on the island. No predators like fox or raccoon are on the island.

There is at least a mile of walkable brick and concrete trail on the island. Bring water, snacks and good walking shoes.

There is a Park Ranger on the island but not much else. It's an interesting look into the past.

## Perception and Reality Science, a collaborative article, Dr. Ed Carlson editor

“When a short red flash is immediately followed by a short green flash, the brain does not see either color – only a single yellow image.” *Scientific American Mind*, November 2005:

“This interference shows that our perception can deviate significantly from reality.”

Cell biology shows that on the inside we respond to the signals of the brain, whether they are *real* or *imagined*. Thus a “boogey man” in the closet can be very real to the child’s perception, with visceral response – though in reality no one is there. See [www.BruceLipton.com](http://www.BruceLipton.com).

Yes, “perceptions” are real to the interior of the person.

No, “perceptions” are not always real (congruent) compared with outside reality, data, and facts.

As a neighborhood, quality of life and being good neighbors are worthy goals. We measure our perceptions – and the perceptions of neighbors – with facts, data, and reality of the outer world. Then, we function from this solid foundation, rather than from imaginations and unsubstantiated “perceptions” of myriad individuals. Sometimes we must adjust our favorite (mis)perceptions to new factual information. This avoids forcing *non-real* perceptions on our neighbors.

Our leaders review laws, rules, and regulations when someone comes with the perception of a problem. Outside reality, data, fact affecting others is determined. Then the person can be properly advised. Sometimes the perception is the problem. Example: Codes violations have a factual basis – rather than preference and perception. Sometimes people continue to complain, even AFTER all codes are corrected.

Yes, “perceptions” can seem real to a person, even with no rational data verification. However, the rest of the neighborhood has the right to a quality-of-life free from personal mis-perceptions. Balancing this is a tough row to hoe in all neighborhoods.

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## Turtle Time

Strolling along the beach at Fort De Soto Park on a summer morning, tiny footprints in the sand tell a story.

"You can see where the hatchling came out of the nest and made a mad dash for the water," explains park supervisor Jim Wilson. "A few lucky ones make it. But baby sea turtles are pretty low on the food chain. When they hatch, they have a lot of things after them."

Wilson, who is lucky enough to actually live on America's Top Beach (as rated by Trip Advisor in 2008), looks forward to summer and sea turtle nesting season.

In a typical year, more than 150 loggerhead sea turtles successfully nest on St. Petersburg/Clearwater area beaches, and of those, more than a third will be found on six miles of undeveloped shoreline in Wilson's backyard.

Loggerheads are one of five species of endangered sea turtles that lay their eggs on Florida's beaches. Peak nesting time runs May through August. On a typical summer day, Wilson starts early and surveys the beach looking for the telltale sign of a nesting loggerhead.

"There is no mistaking where a sea turtle has been," Wilson explains. "They clear the sand around in a big circle, and in some cases, they are still there the next morning. The beach at Fort De Soto, like many other county parks, is closed to the public at night to protect nesting turtles.

"You have to remember that these animals spend their whole lives in the ocean and only come up on land, a foreign environment, to lay their eggs," says Wilson. "They are very vulnerable. We see a lot of false crawls." (A false crawl is when a sea turtle comes out of the water to nest and, for some reason, turns around and heads back to sea.)

"It could be because they saw a raccoon or a night heron and got spooked," Wilson explains. "So you could imagine what would happen if they came up to nest and spotted a bunch of noisy humans hanging around."

The typical sea turtle has 75 to 150 eggs. About 60 days after a turtle lay its eggs, hatchlings scramble from the nest and instinctively head toward the water.

"We come in about 72 hours after the eggs hatch and survey the nest" says Wilson. "Hopefully we find nothing but broken shells. But occasionally we find some that didn't hatch or live hatchlings that didn't make it out of the nest. That is where the public comes in."

"Baby sea turtles are pretty vulnerable," he said. "Birds, ghost crabs, fish... they are on everybody's menu. Only a handful of the original 100 or so will actually make it to maturity."

Human interference on nesting beaches is also a problem in many of the more developed beach communities. Turtles are known to stop midway through the nesting process if humans appear. And hatchlings can also become disoriented by streetlights and walk into roads.

That is why an undeveloped area such as Fort De Soto is so important to the survival of the species. In the more densely populated areas of the St. Petersburg/Clearwater area, beach residents are encouraged to keep their outdoor lights off during the nesting season, May through August, to avoid confusing a hatchling in search of the sea.

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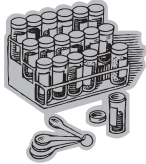


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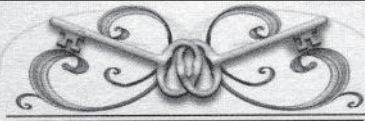
