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


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
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Minutes of the November 15, 2004 Monthly Membership Meeting

A regular monthly meeting of the Jungle Terrace Civic Association was held on 15th day of November 2004 at the Walter Fuller Youth Center. The meeting was called to order by President Killian at 7:00 PM following a social time with refreshments. He then led the Pledge of Allegiance. There were 34 people and 1 dog present.

- ♦ Minutes: The minutes, as reported in the newsletter, were approved by motion duly made and seconded.
- ♦ Treasurer's Report: Skip Mitchell read a detailed treasurers report. The report was filed for audit.
- ◆ Safety: Officer Rich Hladik reported there had been a couple of armed robberies and that the perpetrators had been caught. There had also been a lot of auto robberies, mostly taking contents. He advised everyone to keep their car doors locked. In answer to who was doing the robberies in the neighborhood, Officer Hladik responded they were mostly juvenile boyfriend/girlfriends, etc. He said the only other type robberies were those types which occur in gas stations and parking lots. He reported that due to a hand full of kids they were going to do a lot of home visits making sure probation was being observed, etc. as this did reduce the robberies in the past. He said he might have to start doing these himself. Ron Russell said he heard police were instructed not to write tickets for handicapped parking violations at, for instance Tyrone Mall. The Officer agreed that they don't, mostly, because there were not enough police on the street. Ron said he met with the Tyrone Mall security people recently and they told him to call the non- emergency police number and report when they see violations. It was brought out that there is an organization of elderly people who patrol handicapped spaces and report violations. Officer Hladik told the group there are only two officers at the mall and they are on shifts and handle everything, including as many as 10 arrests a day for shoplifting. A female attendee reported a hole had recently been cut in her vinyl siding then Bob Miller noted that auto thieves tried to break into his vehicle just while he was inside a business. Officer Hladik stated that putting a club on your car is the best deterrent. A member asked about restrictions for registered pedophiles. It was reported that they do have restrictions in distance from schools and other places where children gather. He said he visits the one in Jungle Terrace, but that sexual offenders are different and there are several of them in the neighborhood.
- Nominating Committee Report: Steve Plice, Chairman of the Nominating Committee for 2005, announced the other members of the committee were Ed Carlson and Mary Scott. He then reported the following nominations: President, Tom Killian; Vice President, Ron Russell; Secretary, Lyn Dexter; Treasurer, Linda Mouriski and for Board members: Bob Miller, Skip Mitchell and Larry Dosh (member of the City Beautiful Committee of St. Petersburg). It was asked that it be made known to the voters whether the nominees are homeowners and/or business owners. The chairman stated he thought it was good to have a business owner on the board. The election will be held during the January membership meeting and at that time nominations from the floor will be enter-
- ♦ Redevelopment proposal for the former Joann's Fabrics were discussed at length. Steve Plice reported he and Tom Killian had met with the developer and they want to expand the present building by

adding a home furnishing store to it and build two separate out buildings for fast food restaurants. The developer changed the plan, but still didn't meet the code. They have expanded an area where they will save some of the trees, however 25% of the land is supposed to be undeveloped permeable land and they are still be over about 10% and asking for variance. If the parking was made permeable we probably would approved that. He said the enlargement was towards Bob Evans and buildings are proposed for where the trees are. The developer is also asking for landscape and septic variances too. Ron Russell stated he thought it had been decided years ago to take a hard stance as far as green space is concerned. A parking variance is requested too, they are about 40 under. This would only hurt them, as people won't be parking in neighborhood. They are only 8000 sq. ft. short on permeable area out of the total project that includes 250,000 square feet. Rich Meredith recommended we approve if they agree to his motion, seconded by Ron Russell, that JTCA not object provided either they meet the code or put in permeable parking to the percentage required (per perk, that is to say sufficient area to allow for the same amount of percolation as the required percentage of permeable land) to meet code. Motion passed unanimously.

- ♦ There will be a CONA Committee on Wednesday, November 17 and they will talk about utility lines. **Steve Plice** said we are suggesting they bury lines and indeed they are burying utility lines for new installations or when lines have to be replaced. He stated at that rate it would be 100 years before they are all buried. He said another Leadership course was coming up and to see him if interested. Jungle Terrace will pay the \$69.
- Program: Your Real Estate Taxes: Jim Smith, Pinellas County Property Appraiser was introduced. He suggested that instead of the 40 min speech, do something different...have the audience ask questions. When die during year Homestead still applies next year. The other people with Mr. Smith were introduced as Rick Matanna, and another man introduced as Herb. Ad valorem is the best of all worlds in Florida. We revalue every year and inspect every 3 years. You get notice in August. We'd like residents to come in to the office early in year if you have concerns regarding the valuation of your home. He said he had 160 employees. 217 lawsuits were inherited from his predecessor, mostly for small changes he has instructed his people to make on their own. He stated he had been in business prior to running for office and that he ran his office like a business. Tax increases are limited to 3% maximum per year on home value, but when there is a change of ownership then the new price is used. He thinks after January 1st the seller has to reveal this. Taxes are based on sales in the neighborhood. Mr. Smith was commended for updating their web page frequently, by a member who told him we do appreciate it. Flood zone definitions and criteria was noted not to be available on the website however, Mr. Smith said he believed they could add the elevation in feet. FNIP maps issued in 1982 are the basis for post or pre-firm for this area and St. Petersburg has them. It was noted that Homestead Exemption allows an addition \$500 for widows/widowers, as well as disabled and blind persons. Disabled veterans meeting the criteria are exempted an additional \$5000. These must be filed for by March 1st. Mr. Smith stated there were 13 multi-family, 2473 single family with 30 vacant, of the 186 commercial spaces, 13 are vacant. Residential sales in Jungle Terrace in 2001 were 114, In 2002 there were 137 sales, in 2003 the number was 123, and in 2004 162 real estate sales. Vari-

ous home value categories were stated including that in the \$500,000 to 1 million category there are 58 homes and in the over a million there are 8. Three maps were displayed which illustrated county values up/down, sales, and value.

- ◆ Program: Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals: Amy Edwards & Pogo were introduced by President Killian. She is a volunteer in Education Dept. Pogo participated in the JTCA's recent Pets In The Park event and won the award for "Longest distance to attend". Ms. Edwards informed the group she had adopted Pogo from the SPCA and that they have all types of animals. Pogo did some tricks for the group and allowed anyone interested to pet him. She said every year we get 17,000 in our shelter alone and a number through thru donations (by people who simply don't want their pets any longer). The SPCA's membership fee is only \$15/sr. member. They have a store at Seminole Mall that sells toys etc., and they have a newsletter. Brochures were made available during the meeting. They have 10 acres, and have a horse, geese, and so on, which will retire there. We are an open admission shelter, we take every animal that comes to us as a relinquishment or sick/hurt only, not strays. She said they counsel prospective adopters. There is a two-week summer camp for kids 12-15. Volunteers give talks to schools and youth groups, and group such as Jungle Terrace. Ms. Edwards reported that 40% of children who commit school violence first did animal cruelty. Eighty-two percent of men who practice domestic violence on women have seen animal cruelty in their house. Adults or children can call SPCA to report cruelty or possible cruelty to animals, such calls are anonymous. Calls are investigated. Call if have pet behavior issues and get counseling and obedience classes are offered. Only thirty percent of the animals available for adoption are on the website. The SPCA investigates over 3000 cruelty cases/year. Organized dog fighting is a problem in the area, and such dogs cannot be adopted. Gangs are using dogs such as pit bulls for intimidation.
- ◆ Picnic Report: President Killian reported that 150 people and at least three dogs attended the picnic, here on the grounds, on Saturday, November 6th. He thanked everyone who helped to make the event a success and he also thanked those who attended.
- Newsletter: Bob Miller asked for suggestions for articles for newspaper. He was praised for the wonderful article on the mobile home park.

The meeting was adjourned by general consent at 8:49PM.



The cleanup will proceed as follows. For those residents on the East side of





Vinter Plant Care

Now that the cold weather is here winter annuals such as petunias, salvia, pansies, snapdragons, sweet alyssum and calendulas will begin to grow and flower. Don't forget to fertilize at least once a month with dry fertilizer. If you use a soluble fertilizer, apply at least twice a week.

CITRUS:

Several problems may confront your citrus tree. Oranges may be brown instead of a bright orange. This is caused by rust mites, a tiny insect that sucks the juices from the cells of the skin. Their feeding causes the fruit to turn brown. It is too late to protect the fruit with a miticide now. Spraying should be done earlier in the year. Apply a miticide for use on citrus in June -July and a second treatment should be made October-November.

HOLIDAY PLANTS:

Christmas cactus and poinsettias should have special care, especially watering. The soil in which these plants are grown is a mix that drains very well and dries very quickly. Poinsettias will loose all of their leaves if they dry out, even the slightest amount.

LAWNS:

The warm weather has created some problems with the grass. Weeds are growing more luxuriant than they did during the summer months. There is still time to use a weed killer on the St. Augustine. USE EXTREME CAUTION WITH HERBICIDES. They will kill the weeds but can also kill the lawn. If you have planted rye grass avoid using weed killer on the lawn, the herbicides will kill the rye grass.

MANGOS:

A light application of fertilizer this month will help the tree. Check all trees for scale insects and spray if necessary. Watch for aphids on any blooms of new growth. Use neutral copper or Dithane M-45 on the blooms stalks before they open for control of anthracnose fungus.

PITTOSPORUM:

Cercospora leaf spot will be a problem throughout the winter months. It appears as a light yellow spot on the leaves and attacks the leaf in between the veins. Use neutral copper or Dithane M-45 on a monthly basis.

OUESTION & ANSWER

1. We have an oak tree that doesn't look healthy. There are some dead limbs with bunches of growth that look like balls of grass. What is the problem and is the grassy growth killing my tree?

What you are seeing is "ball moss" which is actually a form of bromeliad. It lives off substance from the air. It does not kill the tree but merely uses it for support. You can see it growing on the utility wires. Apparently, the tree is under some form of

Finding Answers to Your Health
