



Jungle Terrace Civic Association Minutes of Membership Meeting May 19, 2008

The meeting started at 7:00 p.m. There were 25 members present.

Community Service Officer Patrick McGovern gave a report on crime statistics in Jungle Terrace area.

It was moved and seconded to accept the minutes of the May, 2008 meeting as published in the May/June 2008 newsletter. It passed unanimously.

Pete Brown gave the treasurer's report for April and May. It was moved and seconded to accept the report. Pete Brown also gave information regarding tickets for Rays game/JTCA meeting.

Linda Mouriski gave a traffic report. There is going to be a survey taken at 34^{th} Ave, Park St. and 80^{th} St.

Debbie Lawson from the Public Service Department discussed the fact that we can call the Mayor's Action Line 893 -7111 when we see any potential problems in our neighborhood, pot holes, street lights not working, etc. The Mayor's Action Line is also in our newsletter under "Important Phone Numbers".

Steve Plice was invited to give a report on the toxic waste in Azalea neighborhood. He noted that back in 1999, Raytheon said there would be a cleanup. Now we learn that cleanup plan was rejected by D.E.P. No explanation for why it is taking so long to develop a cleanup plan. Raytheon was to submit a report to D.E.P. mapping location of the plume. After D.E.P. approves this report, Raytheon has 60 days to submit cleanup plans.

Steve Lange from POWW gave a very informative

There was a motion made to change the membership meetings to occur every month instead of every other month. Janet will look into this further.

It was moved and seconded to adjourn the meeting. The meeting adjourned at 9:30 p.m.



Walter Fuller Park

Protecting Walter Fuller Park requires the continuing attention of Jungle Terrace Civic Association, and The Real Environmental Preserve Our Parks, Inc (REPOP).

Building a DORMITORY in the park was planned for Spring Training in the mid 1980s, without consulting the neighborhood as required by the City Ordinances. Dr. Ed Carlson wrote a lawsuit, and 300 people gave \$10 each for attorney Tom Reese. The neighborhoods prevailed and suggested a negotiated agreement in place of a lengthy appeal. The Agreement passes Public Hearing and City Council and was approved by the Court as part of its order. The Agreement continues today and the pertinent elements have been permanently made part of our Park Plan in our Neighborhood Plan, both adopted by the City Council.

The City then held a referendum worded in such a way that all other citizens were voted out of having a voice in their parks. Now Walter Fuller is the only park in the City where 65% of property owners within 200 yards of the park must approve major changes to the park.

In the late 1990s, the neighborhood, with attorney Tom Reese, successfully defended the 1987 Agreement in Court against the Soccer League who tried to have it nullified after 12 years, so the City could light the soccer fields across from the residential homes on 30th Avenue North.

REPOP and JTCA worked closely with the City in developing the Capital Improvements Projects that begin in 2008 and 2009. These include overlooks on Jungle Lake, an interior sidewalk around the lake, with sidewalks connecting to the perimeter sidewalks, lights along the interior sidewalks, keeping every third light on all night to prevent illegal activities in the park; the new decorative street lights already installed completely around the

park, revised parking and traffic flow at Walter Fuller Center with an ingress driveway and an egress driveway, keeping the same number of parking places as the main and the auxiliary parking lots, additional basketball court, and more. The 2009 phase is lighted field in place of the shell parking lot for soccer, diagonal parking along 26th Avenue North cutting 3 feet into the park, and making traffic control projections and lane shifts along the narrowed 26th Avenue.

BMX (bicycle) Track was to move, and now is not going to. It was not part of the Park Plan agreed to.

For 5+ years it has become more dilapidated and unsightly because the plan was to move. Currently it is a mess. Photos and letter detailing the issues have been presented to the City with little response. Neighborhood leaders continue to pursue this issue.

Over the years, the struggle has been to keep Walter Fuller Park a true PARK, rather than allowing it to become totally a Sports Complex. There are many of our neighbors who enjoy the park aspect rather than the sports aspect. A balance must be maintained.

20 years ago there were no city events in west St. Pete. JTCA developed the idea of Green Thumb Festival with the City and it has grown greatly every year. There are now limitations on the number of spaces and the number of booths of each type.

Dr. Ed Carlson is the President of REPOP. Janet Herring is the President of JTCA.

Dr. Carlson has been actively protecting our park and our neighborhood for 25 years.

Pinellas Trail Update

You may recall some articles I wrote in the pass about the Pinellas Trail where I showed "before and after" photo's depicting the maintenance and cleanup efforts. (You can review this article on out web site at www.Jungle-Terrace.org and selecting "Pinellas Trail Maintenance Improvements") Also, Dr Ed Carlson wrote an article about Trail Maintenance in the February 2007 newsletter. I also wrote an article about "Trail Fires" in the July / August 2007 newsletter (also available on out web site). This following is an update on these issues.





In the pictures prior and below you can see that indeed there has been a effective maintenance. The picture above is looking toward 38th Ave N with the Tyrone bridge at my back. The picture below is looking toward the Tyrone Blvd bridge with 22nd Ave N at my back.

I did see evidence of one fire near the Tyrone Blvd bridge. Maybe this one wasn't intentionally set and instead was caused by a careless smoker. Let's hope....



We may also be winning the war on Gang graffiti. There isn't as much as a year ago and it looks like the business along Anvil St N are doing their part to cover it up.

Is the proposed roundabout or circle at the intersection of Park Street South and Villagrande a good idea?

That depends on whom you ask.

I have looked into this issue quite a bit lately and have discovered some interesting aspects.

Since the erection of this temporary circle, there has been a dramatic increase in accidents according to the property owners at the northeast corner of Park St S and Villagrande. According to property owners, many drivers are confused when entering the circle – do I go – do I yield – what do I do? Let's face it, many Europeans have grown up with roundabouts, but most American's have not, and they can be confusing – ala Clearwater Beach. In any event, if we are in fact having an increase in accidents, we have to seriously consider if this is a good experiment.

The idea of installing the roundabout was a joint effort between the Old Pasadena Neighborhood



Association and the City of St. Petersburg. The Association felt that "traffic calming" was needed. They claim that the average speed on Park Street S is 40 MPH. I have personally driven Park Street S daily for over 30 years and don't agree with their findings. However, I fully support the right of a neighborhood association working with the City if "traffic calming" is necessary. I want to be clear that I do not have an

issue with the association's rights. I just feel that there are better solutions than roundabouts.

In addition to respecting the desires of the neighbors, we must also respect the rights of other citizens. Many of us living in the Jungle area, shop or dine in Pasadena. Continuing from Park Street N to Park Street South is logical. The City would much prefer that we went east on Central or First Avenue S on to Pasadena. With today's gas prices, who wants to drive an extra block, let alone another half mile? I don't.

In my opinion, the true heart of this issue is tax dollars. The City has budgeted an astonishing Forty Thousand Dollars for this project!

There are others proven means of "traffic calming" which cost a lot less than 40k. Boca Ceiga Drive installed speed tables or Humps at a cost of approximately \$800 each. This has dramatically decreased speeds on that street.

We should all ask our City leaders to be good stewards of our tax dollars. These are difficult financial times for almost everyone. We are all taking up a notch or two on our belts.

Mayor Baker, whom I respect greatly, has the difficult task of cutting services and reducing payroll, among other measures. Times are tough.

How would you like to be the City employee getting a pink slip and then finding out that the City is spending \$40k on a roundabout?

Doesn't sound fair to me. What do you think?

Let your Councilman know how you feel.

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
