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Minutes of the February 21, 2005 Monthly Membership Meeting

- The membership meeting on Monday, February 21, 2005 was called to order by President **Tom Killian** at 7 PM. 34 were present. The newly elected officers were introduced. The minutes of the previous meeting were approved by motion. The treasurer's report was filed for audit.
- A presentation on marketing your home was given by **K. C. Jones** of Realty Executives. K. C. is a member of our association. She advised that kitchens sell houses and that new appliances are key, not top of the line, but new. Also make sure the roof is watertight, the interior is bright and sunny—wash the windows and trim back overgrown foundation plantings. Painting the interior in light neutral colors is very good. Pack up your knickknacks! You want to present an uncluttered, almost sterile, environment. She noted you need to arrange your furniture as if being photographed for a magazine. Ditch the ugly couch! Update bath, if fixtures are dated at least install modern wallpaper and update cabinet hardware. Last but not least the front door area is most important. She concluded by saying you should interview at least three real estate agents and find one you are comfortable with.
- **Rich Hladik** updated the group on crime in the area. He noted there had been five auto burglaries recently. He said if you see strange people in the area call the police. Reports were available.
- Two representatives of the Floridian Pest & Turf Management, Inc. gave helpful information on lawn care, with an emphasis on St. Augustine grasses. Literature was distributed on the many services offered by the company, which is owned by one of our members, Dean Miner.
- **Steve Plice** advised the members of a request for the city to vacate an easement on 74th. Vacating an easement means ownership changes from the government to an individual. Initially the association objected, but now nine months later it is on the agenda again. The committee feels this could be used for trail access and he believes the city staff will recommend that. There is one like it on 38th Ave. and Park St. He requested members attend the EDC meeting on March 2 at 2 PM and to use at least enough of the 3 minutes allotted to each citizen by at least stating your name, address and that you are against vacating the easement. He stressed you should call Tom Killian before going to the meeting to make sure it has not been cancelled. He also urged the members to participate in CONA and they would then receive emails regarding these matters. Note: Subsequently the meeting was cancelled. May is earliest for rescheduling.
- A brief appeal for signatures to get a proposal on the ballot that would require the legislature to review sales tax exemptions every ten years, not necessarily to make changes but to review the various and sundry exemptions approved over the years. **Steve Zachem** informed the assembly the American Cancer Society Walk will be the evening of May 20-21 at the Stetson University, and there are a couple of events prior to the walk. Contact him for details.

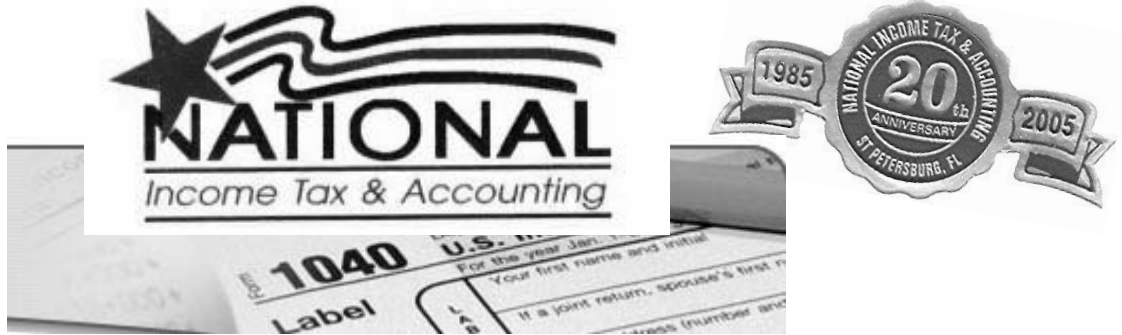

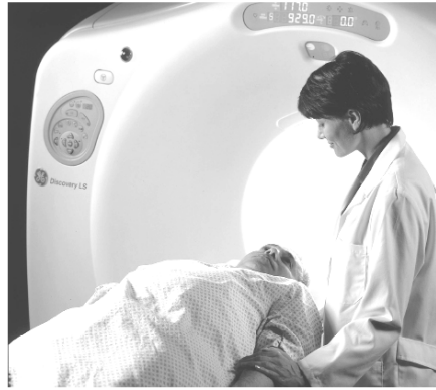
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Wagonwheel & Mustang Flea Markets

The Wagonwheel and Mustang Flea Market's are a fifteen minute drive from Jungle Terrace. It is a real experience for anyone who goes there. The owner Hardy Huntley and his wife bought four acres of land along Park Boulevard in 1967. To pay for the land he started a weekend Flea Market. He then purchased more land,

which now totals 150 acres and has 2 Flea Markets with over 2,000 booths. Their address is 7801 Park Boulevard, Pinellas Park. Both Flea Markets can be seen on your visit because they are next to each other. The Wagonwheel is open Saturday and Sunday 8AM to 4PM year round.

Hardy told me that his son David, who works with him, was the one who convinced him to cover the vendor booths at the Wagonwheel. Hardy's daughter also works with him. It cost \$1.00 per car to enter the Wagonwheel or Mustang Flea Market parking lots.

The Wagonwheel sells 80% new merchandise and 20% used merchandise. There are tremendous bargains such as men's or ladies wallets for \$5.00, leather belts \$2.00, sunglasses for \$1.00-\$2.00 and up. Name brand items at half or less than department stores. There are 2,000 booths (1300 covered) and 24 Food Concessions on the property.

The Wagonwheel is the only Flea Market in the nation that has a tram to carry you from the parking lot to various spots throughout the market. Two million people visit the markets each year and in March the Pinellas County Fair is held there for 5 days.

The Mustang Flea Market is next to the Wagonwheel.

The Mustang has its own parking lot where you pay \$1.00 per car to park and you can walk next door to visit the Wagonwheel. The Mustang is open on Wednesday as well as Saturday and Sunday. Hours are 6AM to 1PM. The Mustang has a ratio of 85% used merchandise and 15% new. Many antiques and collectibles are found here. The Mustang Produce market is a wonderful place to visit. You can buy produce at half of store prices. A great selection of Asian produce and vegetables are found here. If you plan to buy produce, park at the Mustang lot so you won't have to carry your purchases far. Wear comfortable shoes and be prepared to walk, if you get tired there are benches to rest on.

The large food court has reasonable prices and a good selection of snacks and many chairs to rest on. The Flea Market is an excellent place to take visitors who come to Florida. It is close to our area and many people like to browse for bargains and gifts. Hardy told me that many foreign visitors purchase items, take them home and resell them. Please put it on you agenda.

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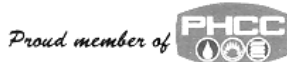

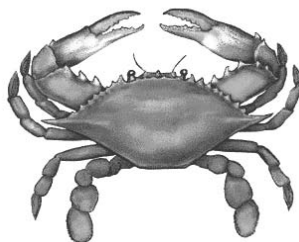

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Retention Pond along 39th Avenue North

After the storms this year and a long period of inattention, the retention pond that is located on the South side of 39th Avenue in Abercrombie Park is getting some needed maintenance.

Neighbors along 39th Avenue North voiced their concern about the pond to JTCA President **Tom Killian**. Tom contacted city officials about the problem. The retention pond will receive some needed work.

The first step was to clean old tree branched, brush, and trash from the pond. There will also be some repairs to the storm water culverts that feed the pond.

There are many retention ponds located around the city. They are required by State law. Their purpose is to collect storm wa-

ter runoff from our streets and yards. This provides a collection point for this water so it has a chance to be absorbed by the sand and allowed to reenter the aquifer. Trash, debris, and fertilizer from yards that is swept up by the storm water and deposited in the retention pond remains in the retention pond so periodic cleanup and maintenance is required.

The reason the state requires these ponds is that without them, the debris, trash, and fertilizer nutrients would enter the Bay and Gulf. The fertilizer nutrients encourage the aggressive algae growth seen in the ponds. I'm sure you can imagine what Boca Ciega Bay and the Gulf would look like without these ponds.

This is the pond after a great deal of work by the City.

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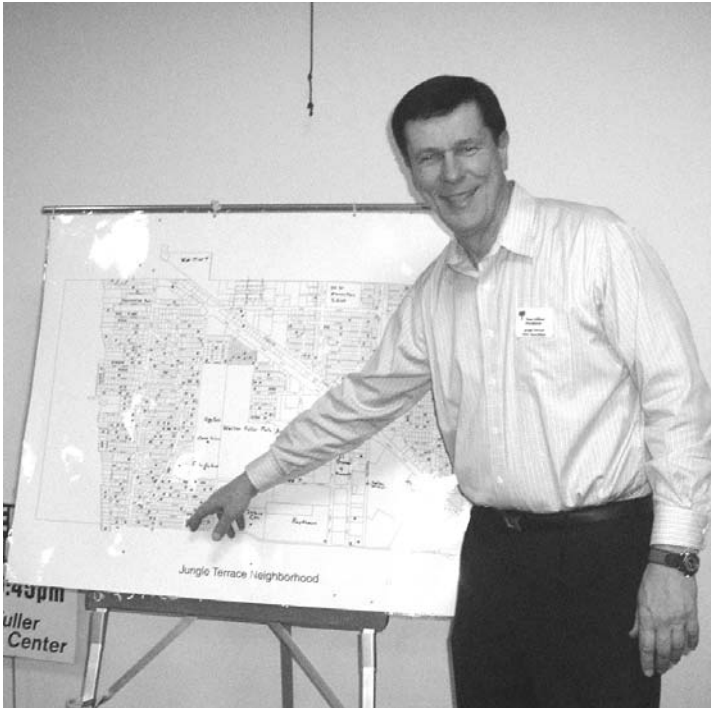

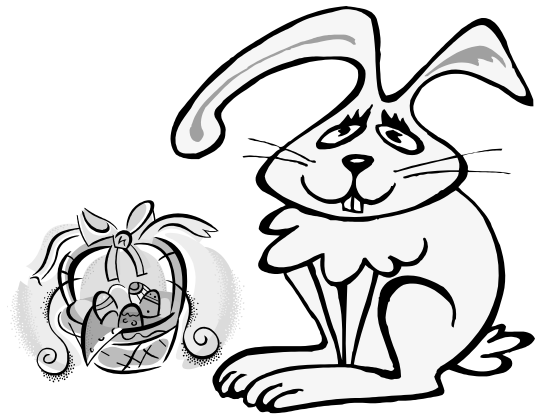

THIS MONTHS GARDENING TIPS

Weed, Weeds, Weeds!!!

Lawns, flower beds and vegetable gardens without weeds is almost a dream in Florida. Regardless of what type of gardening you do, weeds will plague you worse than mosquitoes.

Can lawns be weed free? Will there be always be a battle between you and Mother Nature's ground cover?

No simple solutions are available for controlling weeds. When there is a bare spot or a small open space, weeds appear and take up residence almost magically. They are tenacious, holding onto life as firmly as we do. Weeds are very versatile! They can exist on very little water, grow in the hot sun or shade, establish themselves in the slightest crack of concrete or asphalt, then grow, flower and produce seeds. That is a quest to survive.

Weeds are the best travelers in the world! They hitchhike, float and fly and even hide in garden products you buy. (Rhyming not intentional)

One of the most difficult weeds to control, oxalis (clover), has its own means of spreading. The seeds pod has a built in trigger that causes it to explode when touched throwing the seeds several feet. To say the least they are very adaptable.

The best controls are keeping your lawn healthy; don't let the grass become thin due to insect damage or drought. Always mow weekly; this will not let the weeds produce as many seeds. Keep you flower beds mulched frequently and don't throw the weeds from the flowerbeds into the lawn, your just asking for trouble.

LAWNS: It is time to fertilize grasses, if you have not already done so. Most laws will require a 16-4-8 fertilizer, buy the expensive stuff, cheap fertilizer is just that. Apply at a rate of 6-9 pounds per 1,000 square feet, preferably one that has a slow release nitrogen.

AVOCADOS: Some early flowering varieties may have small to egg size fruit. It is necessary to apply another application of neutral copper or other fungicide to prevent scab.

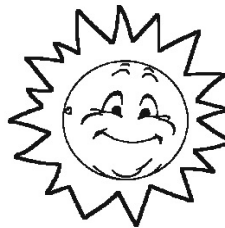
HIBISCUS: Most of these plants will need cutting back. Ideally, about half of the top should be removed. If the plant is very large, you can remove more. Those of you into propagation may want to make some cuttings from the parts removed. A cutting should be taken from the tip, making it about six inches in length. Root these cuttings in good potting mix of peat and perlite, about half and half. Keep the rooting mix moist at all times. The cuttings should root in five to seven weeks, but may take a little longer so don't be discouraged. Once rooted, pot up in individual one gallon containers.

TABEBUIA: One of the most colorful of spring flowering trees. They are available in numerous colors, ranging from white, to pale pink to bright yellow. Most are not hardy below freezing but the gamble is worth the end result. Tabebuia avellanadae I think is one of the most hardiest of the genus. Dr. Ed Menninger's book "What Flowering Tree Is That?" indicates it will survive 25 degrees F.

DAYLILIES: Aphids may attack the new growth. If you see yellow streaked leaves this may be the problem. Look closely for the aphid. Use malathion for control. Fertilizer should be applied. Use a material such as 6-6-6 with fifty percent natural organic nitrogen. Keep plants well watered for more growth and flowering. If you like to collect daylilies you can join the American Hemerocallis Society (www.daylilies.org/daylilies).

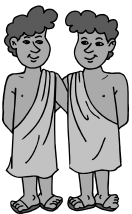
Question: My Burfordii holly has become a pain lately with a white stuff growing all over the underside of the leaf. Is this a fungus?

Answer: Ilex cornuta 'Burfordii' holly is frequently attacked by a scale called tea scale. The scale spins (actually extrudes) a waxy thread like material that covers the scale to some extent. It is most difficult to control. You CANNOT USE CYGON on this plant. Use an oil spray. It can be applied now. Completely cover the underside of the leaf as well as the top. Repeat in thirty to sixty days. READ THE DIRECTIONS CAREFULLY BEFORE MAKING APPLICATION.

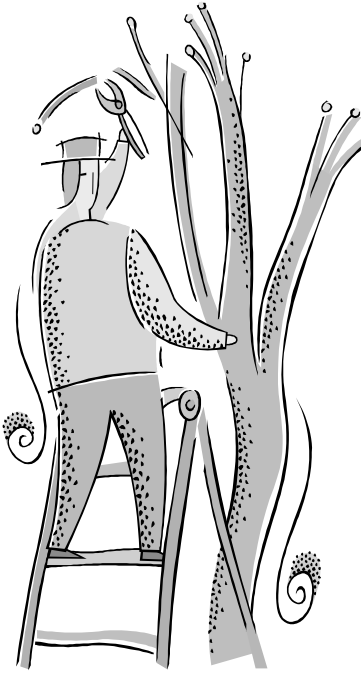
