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President's Message

We enjoyed a wonderful September meeting, packed with information in a short time – adjourned by 8:15 p.m. Our new format for streamlining the meetings is functioning very well.

Crime Prevention Officer MARK WILLIAMS, 893-7773, completed Crime Prevention assessments for the homes of TOM KILLIAN, ED CARLSON and JACK PHILLIPS -- see Jack's "News From the Jungle."

PHIL WHITEHOUSE supervised the painting of the BMX Field House and the Soccer Steel Ship Container by Volunteers. Phil is providing cans of the paint to our WFP Maintenance Crew, DAR-RYL and PATRICK so they can paint out any graffiti with the same color paint.

ENFORCEMENT of the LEASH LAW for animals in WALTER FULLER PARK, beginning with this Plan of Action. Permanent Signs in the Dog Park by both exits – already on corners of park – and at entrance to fingers out in the lake. Temporary Signs (3) around Jungle Lake sidewalk for 30 days. Intense Police presence and tickets 10 days after the signs installed. When you see a pattern of abuse, let us know.TOM and I met in the park with City staff to implement this plan.

CODES SWEEP is wrapping up. Rechecking sites, virtually everything on our list has been accomplished by Codes, Public Service Representative, and St. Pete Police.

PROGRESS ENERGY is revamping lines from the Tyrone Substation on Anvil Street North behind Peltz Shoes. They will be boring underground to bury the lines to 75th Street on the south side of 22nd Avenue. Then they will come up, and raise the existing poles 30 foot poles with 45 foot poles to rise above the trees and decrease trimming of trees. JTCA has written communications requesting IMPROV-ING APPEARANCE of the property as part of the project.

KOPPER KITCHEN owner FRED gifted us a "No Parking, City Ordinance" metal sign to use to nip in the bud parking problems -- like along 26th Ave N. for PeeWee Football -- parking on the grass right of way to watch, when there is plenty of street parking.



Put your car keys beside your bed at night. If you hear a noise outside your home or someone trying to get in your house, just press the panic button for your car. The alarm will go off, and the horn to sounds until either you turn it off or the car battery dies.

This a security alarm system you probably already have. Test it. It will go off from most everywhere inside your house and will keep honking until your battery runs down or until you reset it with the button on the key fob. It works if you park in your driveway or garage.

When your car alarm goes off if someone is trying to break into your house, odds are the burglar rapist won't stick around... After a few seconds, neighbors will be looking out their windows to see who is out there -- the criminal won't want that!

Remember to carry your keys while walking to your car in a parking lot. The alarm can work the same way there.

This is useful for any emergency, such as a heart attack, where you can't reach a phone. My Dad carries his car keys with him in case he falls outside and Mom doesn't hear him. Dad can activate the car alarm and then she'll know there's a problem.



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





At our September meeting Crime Prevention Officer Mark Williams made a very informative presentation on home and personal safety. He informed us that the police department would conduct a free Residential Security Survey that would help us insure that our homes are as safe as possible. I decided to take advantage of this offer. I con-



tacted Officer Mark Williams and arranged for him to inspect our home. I have always tried to keep our house secure with a security system, proper locks and lighting. Plus, all of our neighbors look out for one another's properties. Officer Williams arrived right on time and made a very extensive inspection of the house and grounds. He found that I had prepared the house well and only had a few suggestions to improve the security; these suggestions I have already acted upon.

I recommend that all citizens take advantage of this Residential Security Survey. It is worthwhile to have a professional evaluate your home security and let you know what improvements you may need.

Years ago my wife Lois and I were crime watch coordinators and are aware of the crime prevention efforts of the St. Petersburg Police Department. The police department also offers personal safety courses. Any one interested in the Residential Security Survey or Crime Watch Program should contact Officer Mark Williams at 727-893-4935.

WHAT DO YOU THINK?

Our city officials are in the process of deciding the future of our downtown city pier. Some of the options they are considering are to remodel the existing pyramid shaped building, shorten the approach, and build a new structure or construct a new building on the waterfront. St Petersburg has had a pier since 1895. A picture of the pier is used on most of our advertisements for the city; how we remodel and preserve it is important. The City Council has approved a \$143.000 contract with a Miami-based engineering firm to develop different reconstruction and replacement options for our pier. Perhaps the citizens of St. Petersburg may have some very good ideas of how

they want their pier to look and how it should be used. Now is the time to write or phone your elected city officials and let them know how you think our pier should be restored, remodeled, and operated. Let them know what you think.

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
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Newsletter Articles


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Are my dues paid?
