Traffic report

Our Jungle Terrace Neighborhood Plan approved and adopted by City Council identifies four (4) arterial streets. "Arterial streets" are defined as "Streets primarily designed for the efficient movement of traffic at relatively high speeds." These arterial streets 22nd Ave.,38th Ave, Tyrone Blvd., and Park Street.

Accidents reported on arterial streets in 2007 were a combined total of 212, and for 2008 the combined total was 265 accidents. Location details of these accidents are on the charts below.

Research indicates that to keep traffic off residential streets and to move traffic back to arterial streets requires making the arterial street the more desirable option.


Analyzing crash statistics is a proven process for identifying high crash locations, patterns and the number of crashes.

Speed Humps have negative aspects creating noise, shifting the speed problem to an adjacent street, and delaying emergency vehicle response times. They have minimal impact on the worse drivers, while punishing the most responsible motorist. Speed humps are primarily used when no other option is available. Crosswalks are also a traffic calming tool and are usually selected for low speed, two or three lane narrow streets.

JTCA arterial street crashes are ¼ of the national averages, indicating that JTCA arterial streets are far safer then the national average. Park Street is immensely safer than the other arterial Streets.

Comparing traffic data on Park Street from 2002 to 2008 shows 3,791 **LESS** vehicles per day. Speeds **DECREASED** by 7.1% average and a 23% **DECREASE** in those exceeding the speed limit. Park Street has shown continued improvement over recent years with decreased traffic and decreased speed.

The primary cause of pedestrian injuries is tripping and falling. Analysis of 8 years Pedestrian Crash Report provided by Mike Fredrick, City Traffic Engineer, shows only 1 pedestrian accident with a total of 60 Million vehicles.

Our May meeting celebrated Raul Quintana, City Engineer, with a plaque for his leadership and cooperation in the Capital Improve-

ment Project coming to completion in Walter Fuller Park . In addition to all the other amenities, 53 new trees were planted along the interior sidewalk around the lake. The Dog Park has a gate to the interior sidewalk and two new lights for evening use. New parking lot for Walter Fuller Center with lush landscaping, and the Swimming Pool parking lot received new landscaping. The BMX area is receiving a sprinkler system, sod, a new bench and trees. Raul said, "In all the years, in all the projects we have done in neighborhoods, this is the first time anyone has ever said 'Thank You.'"

Carlos Frey, City Engineer, presented the stormwater drain enlargement from Jungle Lake to Boca Ciega Bay. This welcome project, 15 years in arriving, will relieve much of the flooding in our neighborhood. The actual "digging" begins in January 2010, at a cost of \$5.2 Million.

West Neighborhoods United, Inc. and JTCA have sponsored meetings with the neighborhood presidents for several candidates for mayor so that they know us and that West St. Pete receives their attention. Be certain to attend our July 20 Candidates Forum and Political Night to hear all the candidates.

Award Winning Water Reclamation

St. Pete Water Reclamation Facilities received the Top Ten Facility Safety Award from the Florida Water Environment Association, for leadership and operational commitment to the safety of workers and the public. Congratulations to the men and women who work diligently daily for us and to protect our waters for future Floridians.

Specific recognition by the FWEA, the Earle B. Phelps Award, goes to Northeast Water Reclamation Facility for "Advanced Secondary" water treatment, in honor of maintaining the highest removal of pollutants. The "old plant" (1959) and the "new plant" (1979) average 250,000,000 gallons monthly of influent flow. The staff faces many challenges working with equipment of this age. Ron Nelson, Chief Plant Operator, applied for the award to recognize the operators and maintenance staff who do an excellent job keeping this plant working efficiently.

The FWEA is a member of the International Water Environment Federation of 40,000 water quality experts world wide, committed to the preservation and enhancement of the global water environment. The last time the City won the Phelps award was in 2002 for the Southwest WRF.



Jungle Terrace Civic Association Minutes of Membership Meeting Monday, May 18, 2009

Meeting called to order at 7p.m. There was a motion to accept secretary's minutes without reading and second, motion carried. Upon motion made, seconded and passed: the

Minutes published in the Newsletter are sufficient in lieu of reading at meetings. Pete Brown presented the Treasurer's report. There was a discussion as to whether it needed to be read at every meeting. The motion passed to read the Treasurer's report twice a year in January & July.

President Carlson noted that the Walter Fuller Park Improvements are nearly done and a Park Clean -Up is set for 8a.m., Saturday, May 23, 2009. Volunteers should gather at the Walter Fuller Youth Center with bags, gloves and whatever else might be needed for clean up. Kayaks and canoes are on loan so that the Jungle Lake can be cleaned.

President Carlson reminded membership of the up-coming codes sweep, and that properties of concern should be written down and placed in the brown box at check-in area, given to Secretary Clara Gibson or President Carlson.

President Carlson presented an award of appreciation to Raul Quintana, City Engineering & Capital Improvement on behalf of Jungle Terrace Civic Association. He noted the improvements to Walter Fuller Park are nearly complete and the membership wanted to express appreciation to the City for the work. The award was accepted by Mr. Quintana on behalf of multiple city staff. He remarked this was the only time in his career that a neighborhood association said "Thank You" and had presented such an award – greatly appreciated by the city staff.

Officer Detty reported from March 17 to May 18, 2009 there were 6 residential burglaries, 9 suspicious activity calls, 2 Shots heard, 8 Auto thefts (5 at the Tyrone Mall), 11 vehicle burglaries (8 at the Tyrone Mall). There was one unarmed robbery in Wal-

ter Fuller Park involving two men that knew each other. Officer Detty reported a rash of residential daytime burglaries in other areas – 10 to 15 incidents in an afternoon -- thus neighbors should be alert. Generally the suspects case places to see if anyone is home. They knock or ring the bell, look in the windows, and try the doors. Please lock your doors and keep a vehicle in the driveway. Two have been caught, but Officer Detty advised that neighbors keep alert and call in all suspicious activity. The arsons along the Pinellas Trail consisted of three in one night and thought to be done by one group. The Tiger Auto business was included in this arson.

Neighborhood Partnership Director Susie Ajoc gave a power point presentation to explain what the NP does. NP came into being in 1993 with the strong major form of city government. She explained that neighborhoods and neighborhood associations are two distinct entities. Some issues transcend these groups and extend to entire areas involving all taxpayers.

Carlos Frey, Project Manager for the upcoming Jungle Lake drainage project gave a presentation and answered questions regarding this \$5.2 million capital improvement project. Bids go out in September 2009, and the actual work is expected to begin January 2010.

Under new business, Michael Frederick, Manager of Neighborhood Transportation asked that JTCA vote support for two bicycle projects: 1) Side Path 71st St. N., Belcher to 38th Ave. N. and on to the Pinellas Trail, and 2) W.F.P. Connector under the Overpass. This motion was passed by our membership.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

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
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

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
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
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Newsletter Articles
