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Minutes of February 19, 2007


• The Meeting started at 7:00 pm. There were 29 members present.

Officer Pat McGovern, one of our Community Service Officers (CSO), spoke. The phone number to contact our CSOs is (727) 551-3183. This number

is for quality of life issues and not for emergencies, still call 911 for that. You can expect a call back within 24 hours.

Councilman **Herb Polson** spoke about the new policing system. He also discussed a meeting he had with the County about the Pinellas Trail. He and others did a presentation to County park officials about the problems on the Trail: cleaning out of the overgrowth, maintaining the right-of-way, missing or damaged fencing, etc. The County indicated that there were problems with the contractor for the South County portion of the Trail and they were trying to get it fixed. Councilman Polson also discussed that if the County loses the contractor, they would like the City of St. Petersburg to bid on taking it over. He also discussed that one of our CSOs and/or Debbie Larson would be attending the security meetings with the County regarding the Trail. Also of concern is that people are putting razor blades in "snipe" signs. You are urged to not remove them yourself but to call Code Enforcement and they will remove the signs.

Julie Weston, Director of Development Services, spoke briefly on the designation of the Saffron's building as being historic and she will be following up on that.



Jeff McCarthy, Code Inspector for our area, spoke on the focus of the alleys between 71st Street North and 76th Street North and between 38th Avenue North and 32nd Avenue North. Several questions were asked and Mr. McCarthy answered them.

Julie Weston also spoke of the alleys and discussion about vacating them and the process to do so. There would still be utility easements. The fee is currently \$1,000 to put in the application to do so. There is currently a committee to decide whether to eliminate the fee or not for this. Several questions were asked about this and Ms. Weston answered them.

Ann Wykell spoke about our Neighborhood public art project and finding an artist for our project. She showed different examples of types of art in other communities. Our proposed site for our art project is on the corner of 79th Street North and 22nd Avenue North. Several ideas were discussed for our project.

Bob Miller spoke about the need for someone to do the Home of the Month for our newsletter. He also announced our new newsletter editor, **Kate Sullivan Dehm.**

The meeting was adjourned at 8:40 p.m.



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About Historic Jungle Prada

Saffron's at the Jungle Prada complex rests on one of the most historically significant sits in North America. It was here in 1528 that the 400 man Spanish expedition of Panfilo de Narvarez landed to begin the first European exploration of North America. Sending his six ships back to the Caribbean, de Narvarez, marched north and west with 260 men. After two years of Indian attacks, sickness, and starvation, only four remained: Cabeza De Vaca, two captains, and a Negro Moor. After five more years as slaves to near starving Indians in S.E. Texas and a final year treated as miracle performing gods, the four men arrived in Mexico City. They had traveled 5,000 miles, and were the first Europeans to write about buffalo, opossums, multi-story pueblos, and numerous Indian cultures which no longer exist.



Juan Ofliz, a young Caribbean Spaniard who landed here with de Narvarez, was later captured and spent eleven years as the only white man in Florida, a prisoner of the Indians of Tampa Bay. Saved by an Indian princess from being burned alive by the chief, Ortiz's experience provided the original Pocahontas story. Ortiz was ultimately rescued when Hernando De Soto came through the area in 1539.

The 300 Aboriginal Indians who lived at this site were Tocobagas. Their ancestors had been here for thousands of years. They had a temple mound city with a burial mound (preserved under the Jungle Prada foundation) and twenty small mounds just north of me Jungle Prada (all of which were bulldozed) and 900 foot shell midden made from discarded shells. A remnant of this midden can stilt be visited Today by entering the city-owned woods (from the bay side) just south of Saffron's. The Tocobagas were a fishing culture who are now extinct due to European introduced diseases (smallpox, yellow fever. etc.) to which their bodies had no resistance.

In 1912 when J.S. Shallcross cut through the largest shell mound to extend St. Petersburg's trolley line to Jungle Prada, a Spanish

sword with an ornate handle and about a foot of blade was found in the mound. Subsequently stolen, the whereabouts of this Spanish sword remains a mystery today.

In 1924, millionaire real estate developer Walter P. fuller built the Jungle Prada (originally the Jungle Prado after Havana's promenade) and the Suncoast's first shopping center for Fuller's Country Club Hotel (now Admiral Farragut Academy). The hotel and Jungle Prada catered to such celebrated personalities as AI Capone, Babe Ruth, and AI Lang. The Gangplank Night Club at the bay end of the Jungle Prada building was the poshest on tile Suncoast in the roaring 20'S. Fuller imported Caribbean craftsmen to lay the tint terrazzo floor (now under layers of paint) paying \$.50 a day labor. During the Great Depression, Fuller moved his bachelor quarters into the Jungle Prada and ran for (and won a seat in) the Florida House of Representatives on the promise to build U.S. 79.

Much or the original Spanish Caribbean architecture is still evident today: twisted columns, keyhole portals, open beam ceil-



ing, copper clad Moorish turrets, barrel tile roof, carved tiles, unique radial mullioned windows filling the arches above carved wooden doors, pointed arches, cut and stained glass, stuccoed walls, and diamond window panes, all architectural features of the Spanish Caribbean of the sixteenth century.

Saffron's Caribbean Restaurant is proud to share this history with you, and we hope during your visit you will take time to look around and appreciate this heritage. ***

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

Officer **Pat McGovern** talks about Community Policing at our February Meeting.

Many neighborhood residents all over the city had complained they were not getting timely responses from their community policing officers. To alleviate this problem, the SPPD has altered its policy to enhance police response. We still have three separate districts for our city. I, II, and III. Now each district has four Community Service Officers. When you call the number, you will be able to leave a message and your call will be returned within 24 hours. That is their promise to us. The officers will gather information regarding our problems and concerns and then take appropriate action. Additionally, calls received on the centralized District Community Service Lines will be assigned, extensively tracked via a computer-based reporting system, and resolved with the best possible solution.

Chief Harmon has identified four main issues to be addressed:

- a response needs to be developed to address neighborhood concerns
- community policing needs to be implemented SPPD wide
- performance commitments to the community need to be estab-
- service enhancements need to be made to better handle community issues related to narcotics, prostitution, and cyber crimes.

Chief Harmon has established the following performance commitments to our community:

- Community policing will be practiced 24 /7 by all SPPD personnel
- Citizen calls to the District Service Lines WILL be returned within 24 hours
- a Department representative will attend scheduled neighborhood meetings
- there will be dedicated Community Service Officers whose sole responsibility will be to liaison with the community
- community patrol officers will be available and given time to address community issues around the clock

THE NEW NUMBER FOR THE COMMUNITY SERVICE LINE IS **551-3183** (we are in district 3)

For emergencies, always call 911. For non-urgent concerns, continue to call the 893-7780 number. The SPPD operators can give your information to patrol officers who will either take a phone report or come to your location in a short period of time.

In case you missed it last Water month! Restrictions

St. Petersburg is in a water caution area as defined by the Southwest Florida Water Management District (SWFWMD) and is committed to water conservation. Water restrictions have been placed on outdoor water use and will remain in effect as dictated by the SWFWMD and St. Petersburg. Please note that these restrictions are for St. Petersburg only. If you live outside the city limits, please check with your municipality, Pinellas County, or the SWFWMD for the current water restrictions in your area.

This declaration has required the City of St. Petersburg to restrict watering with potable (city) water, private well water, and private connections to surface water sources (lakes, ponds, etc.) to once a week, according to the schedule below. These restrictions go into effect January 16, 2007 and end July 31, 2007. Restrictions for reclaimed water users is three times a week and voluntary.

Handyman's Corner

Paint Brush Maintenance. How do you properly prepare a paint brush before you paint?

Wet the brush before you paint! To minimize the crusty buildup on the bristles and make brush cleaning easier, dip the brush in water, then shake out (pat dry) excess before you paint with latex paint. If you are using an oil based product, dip brush in the solvent you'll ultimately use to clean



it (e.g., mineral spirits), then spin it dry. This keeps it useable longer before it needs cleaning during the job, and makes it easier to clean at the end of the day. When painting in hot, dry weather, occasionally dip brush in water or spirits during painting to keep it fresh. ***

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

JUST SAY NO TO WHICH DRUGS
