

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## Minutes of the September 19th, 2005 Monthly Membership Meeting

- The September 19th JTCA membership meeting was called to order by President **Killian** at 7:00 pm, and the pledge of allegiance was given. There were 88 people present.
- The format for the evening was noted to consist of a short talk by the following political candidates. **Ed Helm** who is running for mayor discussed curbside

recycling and safety issues. Leslie Ann Curran is running for District 4 spoke on community development issues. Jerald Waller, running for District 6, spoke on voting issues. Virginia Littrell reviewed neighborhood issues from District 4 and community based policing. Kim Trombley spoke of crime and the need for public safety. Jamie Mayo from District 8 reviewed her background. Jeff Danner spoke on bringing Kenwood neighborhood both residential and business development. Darden Rice, District 6, reviewed personal history in the neighborhood. The next speaker was slated to be Eva Joy, however she was unable to attend and Glenn Moon described her background and platform. In the absence of Mayor Baker, Deveron Gibbons spoke regarding development and local parks and recreational items. Maria Scruggs-Weston, District 6, gave her background. Councilman Earnest Williams, District 6, also addressed the group. Although not up for re-election Councilman Kriseman spoke regarding active neighborhood parks for all kids, within 1/2 mile of each neighborhood. Prada Parks/pier was noted to now be open.

- President **Killian** announced upcoming events such as the Pets in the Park; and, November 5th we will be hosting a picnic with CONA. Traffic calming issues were discussed, particularly speed bumps on 30th Avenue North. A vote was taken with the result (for 21 - 23 against) being JTCA will not recommend the speed bumps. Discussion ensued regarding what other options were available to address this traffic issue and President Killian said he would look into it.
- A park for kids is being considered for the neighborhood north of Tyrone Boulevard. Several possible locations were noted.
- Mr. Killian has tickets for the Tyrone Mall which will allow eligibility for a drawing and you get 15-50% off selected retail items, with \$5 going to JTCA and \$3 to the Educational Fund. **Brad Rice** has moved to Fossil Park and **Chuck Boehme** will be the new manager of the Fuller Center.

## Jungle Terrace "City Team Meeting" By: Tom Killian

Every other month our association and key city personal meet to discuss our Neighborhood Plan, Codes, Policing and other important concerns in our area. Pictured L to R are JTCA President **Tom Killian**, Code Investigator **Linda Phillips**, Public Service Representative **Susan Fuchs**, and member **Steve Zachem**. Our Neighborhood Planner **Andy Garr** took this picture. At our August 25 meeting half of our meeting was devoted to solving code issues.

The city of St. Petersburg has 20 code inspectors who cover our city. **Linda Phillips** demonstrates the new lap top computer that all code inspectors now have in their vehicle. With the new lap top they can inspect a complaint, type in the violation and the paperwork can be sent out the next day. This should speed up the response time because each investigator carries about 250 active cases.

The city's current code system is complaint driven. If you have a code issue call 893-7373 your complaint will be logged into the computer and must be followed up. Be sure to give the city the house and street number of your complaint and ask for a case number. You can then follow the complaint thru their system with this number and check on the progress.

We pay some of the highest taxes in the city and deserve to have the best looking area. Many new people are moving into our area who do not know the rules. Please call in violations that you see and make the code investigators do the job that you pay your taxes for. \*\*\*

John Green Director of Capital Improvements City of St. Petersburg presented the Walter Fuller Master Plan Park Improvements on September 12. The plan was presented to the Jungle Terrace Board of Directors from 6-7 PM. The general public presentation was made from 7-8PM. Both groups liked what they heard that night at the Walter Fuller Center. The plan calls for 1.5 million dollars to start work in October 2007, \$600,000 dollars has been allocated for 2008. The parking lot at the Walter Fuller Center will be redesigned for better traffic flow. The area around the lake will be developed so that people can walk the entire lake area. In 2008 the shell parking lot will be developed into a soccer field. Angled parking on the west side of 75th. Street North and on the North side of 26th. Avenue N. will start when the shell parking lot is closed. Walter Fuller Park is the second largest park in our city and our neighborhood looks forward to the upcoming improvements. \*\*\*



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# Political Nite at Walter Fuller Center

We had a full agenda for the September Jungle Terrace meeting. Political candidates for various positions in the St Petersburg City government spoke to the membership. We heard from Mayoral candidates and City Councilmen candidates.

St. Petersburg operates under the strong mayor form of government. This system combines the strong political leadership of a mayor, who is responsible for running the affairs of the city, with an elected city council. The St. Petersburg City Council is an eight member political body whose members each represent a geographical district and serve four year terms expiring in two year intervals. The city council has a chair and vice chair, and sets city policies, the city budget and the mayor's choices for city administrator, city clerk and city attorney. Council Members are selected in district primaries and elected citywide. The mayor, who is elected at large, serves four years. He is not a member of city council.

We also had a spirited discussion followed by a vote on a proposed speed bump on 30th Avenue N between 78th Street and 76th Way N. The membership voted against the speed bump 23 to 21. \*\*\*





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## This Months Gardening Tips

#### October 2005

#### Bananas

Are you lucky enough to have these plants in your home grounds? If you do, then the fruit should begin to mature. How do you tell if it is ready to pick? To begin, it takes bananas about three and a half months to mature from time the first hand is formed. The fruit will become very plump, have no sharp edges and take on a whitish green color. It takes some experience to determine maturity. Once in awhile you will have a bunch that will show some light yellow color and then you will know they are ready to harvest.

#### Caladiums

It is not time to plant but to dig, unless you gamble and leave the tubers in the ground. The tubers should be washed, dusted with insecticide, such as seven to prevent insect damage during storage. Store in a cool dry place.

#### Citrus

Did you fertilize your citrus last month? If you didn't, then now is the time to apply a good citrus fertilizer. It should contain some trace elements. Use one pound for each foot of tree spread. It may be a good idea to have the pH of the soil checked at this time. If the soil is, too sour (acid), then add dolomite.

#### Geraniums

This magnificent winter plant is available now. If you want a most attractive bed, combine them with some dusty miller. I believe you will have more complements than you ever imagined. Both plants are almost disease and insect free during the fall and winter months.

#### Magnolia

Want to grow your own tree? Seeds are all over the trees and if you pick them up now (they are bright red), remove the pulp by soaking in water for four or five days. Then mix them in a moist potting soil and place in the refrigerator for 90-120 days. Then take them out and plant. In the spring they will germinate and you will have a bunch of young seedlings to grow or give away.

#### Maple Tree

Is your maple showing dead leaves on the tips of the branches? If it is, then you have had "maple tip borer". This is a tiny beetle that infest the tips by boring into the small branch. It could have been prevented by spraying the tree with an insecticide, beginning in June.

#### Roses

This plant requires constant care. Pruning of long limbs, not severely, but enough to shape the plant, may be required. Fertilize with a rose fertilizer, spray for control of diseases and insects. Mildew and black spot are the most common problems. Spider mites, thrips and leaf cutter beetle may plaque some of the plants.

#### Lawns

This is the month to apply a weed and feed to control the weeds in St. Augustine. Watch the temperature and do not apply any weed killer if the temperature is above 85F.

#### Q&A

**Q.** Our orange tree has fruit that is brown instead of green. Have we done something wrong?

**A.** Yes. You have not sprayed for control of rust mites. This is a tiny insect that feeds on the outer skins of the orange. It punctures the outside cells of the skin, causing it to turn rust color. It is necessary

to begin spraying in late July for control.

- **Q.** We noticed a very large, dark brown bug, with large horns crawling over the grass. What is this ugly thing and will it damage our lawn?
- **A.** The insect is called the rhinoceros beetle. You were looking at the male. The female has the same appearance but no large horns. It is the female that lays eggs in the lawn. These hatch into a larvae (worm) that feeds on the roots of the grass. They can damage the root system of any grass. \*\*\*





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## Working Out and Sports **Playing It Safe**

Daily Stress, aerobic activities that push the body to its outer limits, and lifting weights put abnormal amounts of stress on bones, muscles, and joints. Full speed collisions, falls to the ground, and head and limbs being rammed, pulled and twisted beyond their normal ranges. Even seemingly normal, easy, or moderate exercise. What are some of the damaging effects of this punishment? How likely are you to develop problems or be seriously injured, and how can you be sure you are performing at your optimum?

The development, growth, and function of our bodies is directed and controlled by the brain, spinal cord, and nerves. Luckily, the brain is in a vault of bone. However, although the spinal cord and spinal nerves are also damaged or misalign easily, this creates pressure and interference to the spinal cord and nerves that will result in obscured growth, improper development, and poorer function.

When the muscles and joints are not working properly they will become less flexible, weaker, and more likely to become injured or deteriorate into arthritic or degenerative conditions. This pressure and interference causes decreased nerve supply to the tissues, organs, and systems of the body.
