

21 Flowers that Attract Bees

US bees are dying at an unprecedented rate. YOU can do your part in bolstering the bee population! **Planting flowers that attract bees provides much needed food for pollinators near you,** and can require as little space as a window sill. From herbs and ornamentals to hardy winter bloomers, bees benefit.

Do : diversify and maximize blooms

To help bees make the most out of their active months, it's ideal to have plants that bloom at different times across the seasons. Early spring and late autumn blooms will be especially helpful for early foragers or bees going for their last harvest before hunkering down for the winter. It is also ideal to have a variety of flower shapes – from flat to tubular – to accommodate bees with different tongue sizes. If you have a grass lawn, consider replacing it with colorful pollinator plants to make better use of your space and save water. You can also make a compromise by allowing your lawn to share space with flowers that attract bees, such as dandelions, clovers or siberian squill (more on squills below).

Don't : plant treated or hybridized plants

It is extremely important to **avoid using any insecticides**, **herbicides or pesticides** – even organic ones contain substances that are harmful to bees. Pesticides contain neonicotinoids, chemicals that are a known danger to bees. Avoid hybridized plants ... often less beneficial for bees (more info on this <u>here</u>).

Plant for Bees

They say flowers that attract bees also bring good tidings for the gardener. There's something undoubtedly powerful about planting pollinator blooms. With every haven we create for bees, we make clear our valuing their importance, we designate ourselves as their allies.

ABERCROMBIE PARK's Kuttler Estate Addition

City purchased 2.3 acre Kuttler Estate on Boca Ceiga Bay adjacent Abercrombie Park. City hosted a meeting at Walter Fuller Center to share plans for integrating into Park.

This meeting was well attended including Mrs. (Kuttler) Hines. An extra row of seats had to be added before the meeting started. I estimate about 35 people. All JT board members present.

Abercrombie Park is one of 4 city archeologic parks that will be tied together to tell the whole story of the area. Jungle Prada and Maximo are two of the other three. The area was occupied from 200-600 AD and from 900-1300 AD. Protection of artifacts is a main issue. There are no plans to do any digs at this time. It may be possible in the future, but only with a university involved and total coordination with the city.

The Kutler Mound was going to have a Plexiglas cut away after the pool was removed from the house site so people could get a view of the mound contents. In speaking with other cities that had done this as part of a historical display it was determined this was a bad idea. The Plexiglas became scratched, there was thief from the exposed areas, and mold developed. As such, when the pool was removed, the area was backfilled to reshape the mound to its original size.

There is a need for erosion control along the bay which is being investigated as to how best to accomplish this. There will still be access to the park from the bay via kayaks but an old oyster bed is there and difficult to navigate. The existing pier has been determined to be unsafe. Whether it will be removed or restored is still under discussion.

The public access will be from the existing parking lot with no additional parking planed. This did not go over well with the audience attended by many people along 39th Ave. N. They complained of cars parking on "their" street and one case in an individual's driveway. Barbara Stalbird, from park services told that person to call the police if it happens again. There is apparently al parking issue on Saturdays from 9:30 am and going to noon. The city will send out police to investigate.

The development plans for the creation of a boardwalk complete with signage to present the history of the area. There will be signs informing the public not to walk on the mound. The timeline for the completion of the boardwalk is 6 to 8 months. Once this is done, the existing fence will be removed.

The people along 39th Ave. want a gate at their end of the street for park access. They were told this could be done, but when the originally discussed at a downtown meeting in the past, the people along the street told the city they didn't want public access along their street. Now apparently, they do. Also, the gate would remain open day and night. The city is not staffed to do locking and unlocking.

There is an online website being developed by USF that will enable the public to take a virtual tour of the park on their mobile device. This could be a first in the US when it is finished. The timeline was the end of this year.

JUNGLE LAKE "SEWER-WATER SAGA"

Contractor hooked up reclaimed final filter backwash, supposed to go through entire treatment cycle again, to the Storm Drain. Over 50 days, this dumped 1.7 Million gallons of partially treated sewer water into Jungle Lake. The nutrients caused a huge vegetation overgrowth obliterating the lake, which could not be controlled by normal treatment. Four weeks of mechanical removal by WEEDOO, and AquaHarvester cleared the majority of the aquatic weed overgrowth, the balance was controlled with normal treatment. Heavy equipment damaged and depressed the fingers out to islands, reducing their design efficiency to clean up water before it enters Boca Ceiga Bay. City plans to restore fingers.

Jungle Terrace Civic Association Board of Directors has been constantly diligent over the months keeping focus on the rehabilitation, keeping City's "feet to fire."

\$318,600 System to keep Jungle Lake Clean from Stormwater Runoff

Type II **Nutrient Separating Baffle Box** (NSBB) with an Up Flow Filter (UFF). The NSBB contains sediment collection chambers, a biomass separating screen system, and a skimmer. The UFF contains Bold & Gold, a biosorption activated media to further reduce nutrients, total suspended solids, and pathogens entering the lake.

The NSSB will be maintained at least twice per year and more if required. Maintenance consists of removing debris collected in the biomass screen and the sediments in the chambers utilizing a vactor truck. The material is disposed of at the county landfill.

The NSSB is estimated to collect 190 pounds of total nitrogen, 32,000 pounds of total suspended solids, and 16 pounds of total phosphorus each year.

STATE OF THE ECONOMY in ST. PETERSBURG

During the 2018 State of the Economy Presentation, statistics around core areas were presented to citizens, business leaders and community stakeholders, including: population; socioeconomics; revenue generators; real estate; business development; and infrastructure & quality of life.

Some key highlights include:

- The highest construction value on record in 2018 at \$695.9 million and over 34,000 permits issued, breaking last year's record of \$671.7 million, the 8th consecutive year with increasing construction value and permits issued.
- The Tampa St. Pete region has a cost of living index of 89.6, the lowest of all major markets in Florida and of our peer cities. The cost of living for the region has decreased annually over the last 4 years.
- St. Petersburg's average home sales price was \$192,000 in October 2018. The average sales price for St. Petersburg from Oct 2017 to Oct 2018 increased by 12.9%, the second highest increase amongst peer cities.
- St. Petersburg's unemployment rate is 3.30% ... lower than the Tampa Bay region, the State of Florida, and the US. The unemployment rate has continued to decline annually since 2015.
- Since 2014, there has been a 21.9% reduction in poverty and ranks second best change compared to sister cities.







